

Portrait of Lillian Luyinda Mutesasira



Those who regularly use UN flights know what **MOVCON** means. Other people believe it is a department responsible for transporting staff members, UN partners and the cargoes dispatched to the sectors or the cargoes coming from the sectors to Kinshasa. The exact title is: **MovCon Traffic & Shipping**. They facilitate our trips on board UN flight with our luggage and other stuff! Moreover, it is worth noting that the first person met by a newly arriving staff member when joining the mission is a MOVCON staff; this shows the critical role played by MOVCON staff for the Mission's personnel. Lillian does work in this unit. She is based neither in the sectors nor in Kinshasa; she works in Entebbe, Uganda, at MONUSCO's logistic base.

After being selected by her supervisor to feature in the **"Portrait of the month"**, I met her at the office which she shares with two colleagues. Sitting behind her screen, she confides herself to me with a beautiful smile which makes me forget the many hours and kilometers spent on board the aircraft to get to her office. When did the United Nations start

employing the under aged, I wondered; she looks very young indeed! Come on Lillian, tell me everything: **"I work as Assistant for the department that deals with all Inbound and Transit commercial cargo transportation to/via Entebbe."** Is that all? Let me now ask you some questions...

United Nations - was it by sheer luck or a personal choice? **"It is a personal choice; I joined the United Nations on 1st April 2010. I am happy to work for the UN, I feel honored. After completing my education, I started my professional career with SkyNet Worldwide Express, a courier company as an Operations supervisor for three years; then I was promoted to an Operations manager position. My roles included tracking all National and International deliveries to/from Uganda, including the supervision of up to 33 staff. After spending 5 years with SKYNET, I joined MONUSCO. Ever since, every morning, I am keen to get to my office on time; bearing in mind that I would meet my colleagues with whom I feel comfortable."** Did she get her high school certificate at 12? One would be tented to ask. We would look into that after, but for now, let us wee with colleagues if they **"feel comfortable with her as well."**

Let us first hear from her supervisor Marc Daniel **"Lilian has been (and continues to be) a major player in the MONUSCO ESB Movement Control creativity arena. She possesses tons of ideas in the traffic and**

shipping unit and has helped inspire with her teaching, speaking and writings. Our MovCon Section, the Entebbe Support Base in general, remain grateful for her professionalism! Well, the standard is set high. Who else has more to say about her? Yes, Joseph Ogwang, one her male colleagues: "Liliane is a woman who puts priority on her work. She always arrives in time for duty and strives to make work enjoyable by her colleagues. She is knowledgeable and has excellent attributes best suited to the core values of the United Nations. She has very strong consideration for women in quest for equal opportunities and privileges. She openly discusses topics like the emancipation of women and the education of the girl child for the optimum development of the nation. Her choice of the portrait of the month isn't by sheer luck, but will be tremendous and encouraging for her fellow women colleagues working in MONUSCO, Uganda to stand out in excellence."

Be blessed Félix, on that note you take me right to my next question. Are you a feminist, my dear Lillian? Some people might think it as a normal thing for a woman to be a feminist. Unfortunately, not all women are feminists in their approaches and actions on a daily basis. Should we take the example of children's education! Stereotypes are repeated time and again by their mothers. They let boys go and play soccer outdoors and girls assigned to household work as if their fate was sealed in household work." ***I don't think so; I know many women who work in the United Nations. Lillian, Sorry, I am being a bit too talkative. Go on please, I am all ears "Yes, I am a feminist because I believe in equal rights to all genders and I am totally against certain Men's flawed perceptions towards women. I am totally against gender-based discrimination, objectification, oppression and stereotyping of women. I don't need to make women strong - we already are - But we must change how the world perceives our strength. I urge all my fellow women out there to strive and excel in their careers, hold their own and keep their heads high."*** I have to confess, at first, I thought she was shy. Here is yet another stereotype I need to depart from. A woman, when invited to talk, is not necessarily shy. They are so humble. Well, we must drop this one too. I attended many cultural galas during the 6 years I spent in Istanbul, Turkey where we had to promote cultural awareness and my personal contribution in making the Ugandan culture known was to cook some of our local foods and I also dress culturally whenever the opportunity avails itself.*** Yes of course Lillian you are right to do so! Not forgetting one's root help to thrive and move ahead.

Do you have other activities other than your job, which ones? Please don't talk about cooking, cleaning and polishing... ***I play volley ball in my free time and I also sing in my church's choir.*** Well, I came close to missing the target! ***I also love to tend to my family, I have two beautiful daughters with my husband Luyinda Moses, a handsome man...*** she said, laughing. Hold on, do you mean, we have to start selecting the most handsome. They need beautiful and smart women, we also need handsome and smart men... Well, both if it is possible, otherwise, handsome more preferably, It he does not open the mouth, one would not know about the other quality.
